

DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Americans rarely talk about class. We seldom reference it in literature, film, fine art and theater. We look at other ideas when discussing poverty, race, feminism, religion and politics, but almost never look at economic divide.

We are all familiar with the standard reference in our collective consciousness of "pulling ourselves up by our own bootstraps" and the success stories of "self-made men," but our collective storytelling tends to overlook the other stories of, as Margie puts it, the "uncomfortable."

It's not that we should be deifying the people whose stories we hide but as David Lindsey-Abaire's "Good People" so beautifully posits, the stories should be a part of the conversation.

The play does not lead us down some primrose path that asks us to agree with one point of view over another. It doesn't indicate that one character is more likable than another or that one character is worth rooting for more than the other. These decisions the author leaves up to us. What he does do is share with us the complexities of poverty. Is it the person or the circumstance, luck or fate, personal ambition or just plain laziness? In fact the play works hard to dispel all notions of sentimentality by asking the hard questions with grace and great humor. No small feat.

The playwright focuses on "Southie" a particular neighborhood in Boston that has become quite popular in recent years in film (The Departed, Mystic River), TV (Ray Donovan) and literature (Dennis Lehane's novels), as a stand-in for a certain working class ethos. But beneath the colorful characters and language is a gap between the richest and the poorest among us, which is now wider than it has been since we all nose-dived into the Great Depression. What "Good People" asks is that we add stories of class, money, and making it in America to our mythology, so our stories include everyone, not just those who are at the summit of that dream.
